Get your child vaccinated today. You can reduce your son or daughter's risk of HPV-related cancers by up to 99%.

anus and throat in both sexes. HPV can also cause genital warts.

The HPV vaccine can prevent the HPV infections that cause these cancers and genital warts. Get your son or daughter vaccinated at 11 or 12 years of age (when they produce a higher immune response), or as soon as possible if they are already 13 to 26.

The HPV vaccine is recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Physicians, and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists.

HOW DO I GET THE VACCINE?

The HPV vaccine is available through the federal Vaccines for Children (VFC) program, which covers vaccine costs for children and teens who are underor uninsured.
